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Camden County Commission Meetings

The revised Unified Land Use Code was presented at the August 31 commissioner meeting, and Static License Plate Readers were discussed at an evening meeting on August 29th. Video available at camdenmo.org

The commissioner assigned committee provided background and a review of the updated R1 and R2 sections of the ULUC.

Many restrictions that previously required a visit to the Planning and Zoning Board of Adjustment have been removed. Changes were made to the regulation that required only a residence could be built on a lot. This made sense as it would allow owners to build a garage or a septic system on a separate lot from where their house sits. Restrictions remain on separation of potable water and a septic system when located on the same lot. The theme was definitely personal property rights associated with doing as you please on your own property. It was made clear that this applies only to unincorporated county properties, not including areas subject to restrictions from cities, towns or HOA's.

One member of the public had the audacity to mention short-term rentals. This instantly produced nervous giggles from the Commissioners and a rush to mention ways to recuse themselves from ever addressing that concern...ever.

With the issue of climate change, the forces that push to divide us have been wildly successful. What a shame we cannot talk honestly and peacefully with each other to develop plans to heal our environment. All communication is now encapsulated in the war about "climate change" because it is code for "government tyranny."

We know that China and India are the uncooperative world leaders in producing greenhouse gases. We also know that the only way to have successful global influence is to be economically dominant. Currently, the US is responsible for about 15% of global CO2 emissions. That is down from over 50% in 1950. We almost never recognize and appreciate these successful efforts, like the invention of the catalytic converter in America.

Most people have deep concerns about our environment, but all they see in the mainstream media representing that concern is "climate change." To them, the term represents an unacceptable all or nothing pathway leading to economic downfall. This is an example of the enemies of our Republic successfully controlling language. In the days prior to the meeting about Static License Plate Readers (SLPRs - fixed cameras that capture license plate information), the Presiding Commission published a video encouraging the public to come give their valuable input. He mentioned in the video how he was elected to protect our liberty, so expectation was high the Commission would propose a ban on all types of surveillance equipment that gathers information from citizens without a warrant.

I recommend everyone take a look, not just because of this issue but to see how our politicians handle the tough questions.

The Sheriff's deputies spoke about the static cameras and also about cameras inside the patrol cars. They were clear about how these cameras will aid law enforcement. Community members then spoke about how these cameras have the potential for mass surveillance capabilities and how they do not want to go down that slippery slope. The Deputies, and the company who supplies the equipment, assured everyone that the surveillance footage is never stored, or transferred to others, or hacked...so whew, that's certainly a load off our minds...just like we can be sure electronic voting machines are 100% secure 100% of the time...

No doubt the Deputies were speaking from the heart, with a view of the importance of catching criminals and perhaps not having sophisticated knowledge of how data can be mishandled outside of their view. They frequently returned to the point that cameras exist and that their use will continue to be expanded on state property (highways), and in the cities (existing on HH in Lake Ozark) unaffected by any decisions made at the county level.

There were several speakers from the community who were very eloquent, and I hope you will check out the full video. One made the point that while we may trust the current regime to protect our data (do we?), what about down the road when others are in charge? **Security versus Freedom is the challenge.** No question in my mind...Freedom first, last and always.

Given the lead-in by the Presiding Commissioner, we were all ready for the move to ban these cameras on county property. The citizens that filled the room were clearly supportive of the ban. The Commissioners suddenly began to waffle, and said they were surprised to find out the data gathered was dumped if a plate match was not found. They seemed to forget that we cannot know for certain that the data is dumped immediately, or in the future...that's the whole point.

The Commissioners passed a motion to table the issue "for further review." **They did not ban the cameras.** They said they want the County Attorney and Sheriff to discuss appropriate restrictions. In a more recent video posted on Facebook, Commissioner Skelton said they would "restrict and prohibit", which I mentioned was contradictory and asked for clarification. The comment back from Commissioner Skelton was "in the video I inform the citizens the proposed ordinance would prohibit the Static License Plate Readers in the unincorporated areas." He only mentions the "Static" or fixed cameras...no mention of data gathering cameras inside the deputy's cars as discussed at the public meeting. We'll review the ordinance when it's available.

2024 is on the horizon, and with it, elections!! Next year's choices will be critical in the fight against the woke regime currently attacking us from Washington, D.C.

For the first time since 1996, Missouri will choose delegates for the national tickets via party caucus. I like the idea that the folks who will have the most influence are those that care enough to become educated about the candidates and show up to work for their party.

At the caucus, members of a political party meet in person at an appointed time and location to discuss the presidential candidates and debate their merits. The voting for candidates happens either by raising hands or by separating into groups, with the votes being counted manually by counting the number of supporters of each candidate. You must be a member of the political party to participate in the caucus. Here in Camden County, party caucuses will be held at local precincts with dates and times to be provided by local party leaders.

The County Clerk's office is not involved in the caucuses. They follow their election process to hold the primary election as usual, which includes presidential candidates along with the many down ballot choices for local offices. Primary outcomes for president have never been binding in Missouri, but I expect around here we will see primary votes and caucus results matching up...making it clear to state party leaders who Camden County supports.

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
